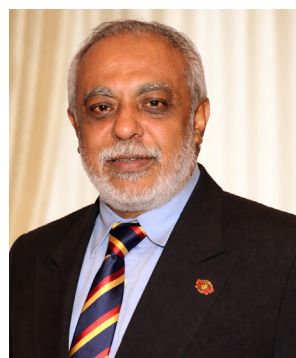

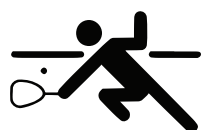

Everest Base Camp EBC Trek: 15 Days on the Roof of the World

The stark beauty of the Himalayas

For months, my life was measured in discipline and vertical gain. Success at high altitude started at home with a relentless 12km weekly running routine. While the world slept in, I was out on the roads pounding the pavement or hitting the hill trails every weekend to ensure I was ready for the challenge ahead.

I knew that at 65, the Himalayas wasn't about to give me a seniority pass. To reach Everest Base Camp, I had to be more than fit; I had to be fitting fit.

The Ascent of a Lifetime

The journey began with the legendary flight to Lukla, an airstrip renowned for being the most dangerous in the world. Stepping off a small plane, I was immediately met with air that felt thin, cold, yet full of promise. As I spent the next 15 days negotiating the Himalayas, the comforts of my familiar world were replaced by the gritty reality of the mountains.

The trek proved to be a mental challenge that matched the physical demands of the terrain. Moving from the vibrant hub of Namche Bazaar (Sherpa village) into the stark, high-altitude landscapes of the Khumbu region, the Nepalese trekking mantra was always "Bistari, Bistari" (slowly, slowly). Although there were moments when the

incline was daunting and the cold seeped into my frigid bones, I did not allow myself to waver in fulfilling my goal throughout the 15-day journey.

The Turning Point

The most formidable challenge wasn't the steep climbs, but the psychological shift required at tackling the high altitude. When your breath is short and the terrain is unforgiving, you discover what you are made of.

I chose the sobriquet "Unstoppable" not because I was intent on deprecating the difficulty of the path in front of me in order to shore up my spirits, but because I refused to let the environment impose limits on me.

Beyond the Comfort Zone

If this expedition taught me anything, it's that we are capable of far more than we are prepared to credit ourselves. Age, height, and expectations are merely variables; determination is the only constant.

Find your Everest. It may not be a peak in the Himalayas, but it should be a pursuit that summons you to your highest effort. Through careful preparation and a deep respect for the task, stay persistent in the goal you set for yourself.

Sir Edmund Hillary, the first conqueror of Everest, is reputed to have said on being asked why he attempted the climb: "Because it is there."

It was a succinct answer capturing all that could be said about motivation and possibility.

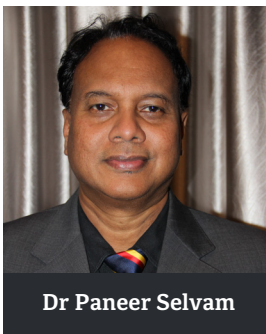

Match 3: K9s vs MPSJ Knights

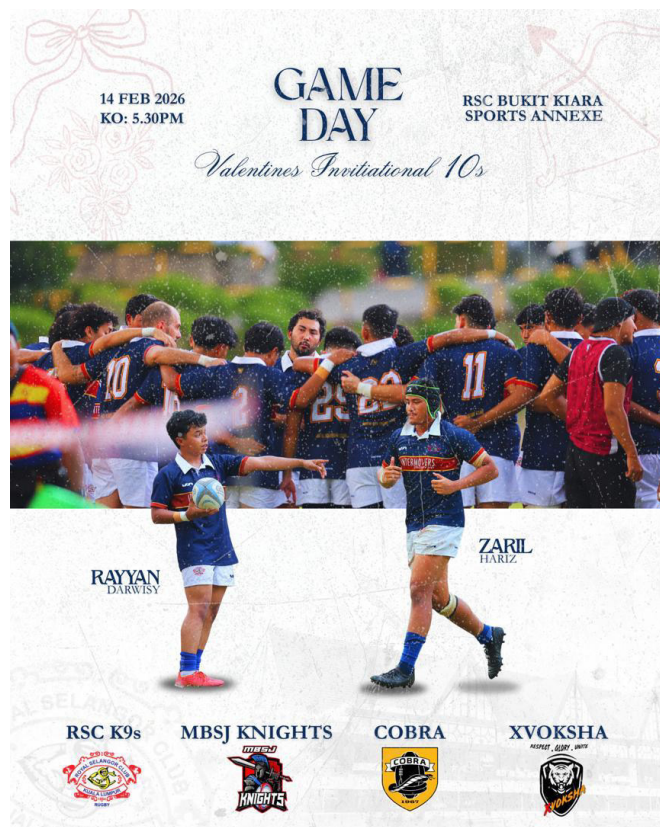

The next match saw Cobra push XVoksha in a fiercely competitive contest. XVoksha, however, maintained composure and edged a narrow 10-5 victory, emerging as the team to beat.

Unfortunately, the match was marred by a serious injury to a Cobra player, requiring immediate medical attention and ambulance transport to hospital. With medical services deployed — and safety protocols mandating on-site ambulance presence — match officials, in consultation with team managers, made the responsible decision to call off the remainder of the tournament.

K9s back in the fold as full club member in the KRS

After being left in the lurch in the KRS (Kesatuan Ragbi Selangor) for 7 trying (pun intended) years, RSC Rugby (otherwise better known as the K9s) are back in the fold. KRS has upgraded K9s's membership - to a notch higher in the hierarchy of membership category in the KRS where we rightly belong. To where the likes of our nemeses such as KL Tigers, Cobra, Saracens et al are so perched. No prejudice in any way is implied, but membership status is something that counts for much considering that rugby has been played on our hallowed padang for the longest time. In fact, decades longer than before the KRS itself was first founded let alone the MRU.

The apparent lurch all began as the result of the coming into effect of the Sports Development Act 1997 (SDA), when in 2018 the KRS rightly or wrongly had deemed it fit to amend their Constitution such that RSC Rugby among others were no longer considered full Club Members, unless RSC in compliance with the SDA apply to be registered with the Office of the Commissioner of Sports (OOTCOS). Therein causes the conundrum. RSC (under whose ambit where RSC Rugby is but one of its 19 other sports sections) is in essence a ROS-regulated establishment. It cannot at the same time be regulated by two separate Regulators.

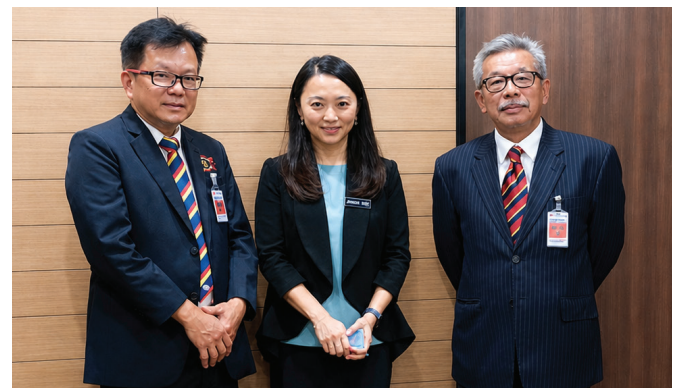
Putting things in perspective, it is worth noting that in its heydays KRS (better known in those days as the SRU) had held the biggest rugby league in the nation. Sadly, many of its notable fraternities of old like Anchorman, UMBC, JKR, MCOBA, UiTM, UKM, NST, UM Blues to name a few, had all but left the padang either by way of attrition or through defection. What now remains to carry the torch for the KRS at last count, are but less than 10 full Club Members (K9s included) whose rugby spirit is unbroken? Yet the KRS is ironically insisting to be strict in deciding who is or isn't to be its full Club Member when membership numbers are diminishing.

In any case, the degradation by the KRS of our membership status as an Associate Member, had not only deprived us the right to vote but we were also ineligible to be elected to any positions in their Exco Committee, thereby rendering our attendance at their AGMs as good as observers. The requirements to obtain match sanctions and the much-needed grant to fund our activities also became cumbersome issues to navigate. The

coup de grace to our historical stature as founder-member of the KRS was perhaps delivered when in 2018, we were asked to vacate all positions which we had until then held in their Exco Committee.

Nevertheless, a review of the relevant sections of the SDA by this Section Committee (SC) in 2023 revealed the key clause that only a "sports body" which acts as the governing or representative body of a sport in Malaysia is required to register with the OOTCOS. Neither does RSC Rugby nor RSC hold a position of authority requiring such a role. The requirement by the KRS for RSC to register is in our view ultra vires the SDA. By definition RSC Rugby is not a sports body.

This was communicated to the KRS, but they were unmoved. Holding steadfast to our stand, this SC then leveraged the case of our predicament a couple of notches up by appealing both to the then Minister of Youth and Sports and the new President of the KRS in May 2023 and September 2024 respectively with the hope that the OOTCOS would be persuaded to grant RSC Rugby an exemption from registering or that the KRS would be convinced to amend their Constitution such that our full Club Membership status is reinstated.

Tactful diplomacy, continuous perseverance and due diligence in following up eventually paid dividend when both of our hopes were achieved. At their AGM of February 2025, KRS eventually tabled a proposal to amend their entire Constitution such that among others our affiliation issue with them is resolved. In any event, the proposal was unanimously approved and carried.

In particular 2 amendments of KRS's Constitution are of relevance and significance viz: -

1. That Clause 6.1.1 as amended, has now among others allowed KRS to extend full Club Membership to include the RSC Rugby notwithstanding that RSC is ROS regulated. That this inclusion is granted as a special case for RSC is perhaps in due acknowledgement by the KRS of our name, history and contributions to the sport.

2. That in corollary, Clause 10.1 as amended, has now among others permitted RSC Rugby to submit 2 representatives to attend KRS's AGMs who shall thereat be entitled to 1 vote each in the election of office bearers.

Subsequently, in their letter of 13 November 2025 to the KRS, the OOTCOS wrote to inform that the entire amended Constitution had on 13 August 2026 received their official endorsement and is enforceable with effect from 13 August 2025.
